The Conservative Movement and the Vietnam War

Mexico's Drug War and Criminal Networks examines the effects of technology on three criminal organizations: the Sinaloa cartel, the Zetas, and the Caballeros Templarios. Using social network analysis, and analyzing the use of web platforms Facebook, Twitter, and YouTube, Nilda M. Garcia provides fresh insights on the organizational network, the central nodes, and the channels through which information flows in these three criminal organizations. In doing so, she demonstrates that some drug cartels in Mexico have adopted the usage of social media into their strategies, often pursuing different tactics in the search for new ways to dominate. She finds that the strategic adaptation of social media platforms has different effects on criminal organization's survivability. The Other Side, Or, Notes for the History of the War Between Mexico and the United States

Via rigorous study of the legal arguments Spain developed to justify its acts of war and conquest, *The Other Side of Empire* illuminates Spain's expansionary ventures in the Mediterranean in the late fifteenth and early sixteenth centuries.
